⁽²⁾sunstroke ⁽³⁾E.S. Wound left side ⁽⁴⁾wound of left ankle

Degree of disability.

In our opinion the said Moulton
 is ⁽¹⁾1/4 ⁽²⁾0 ⁽³⁾0 ⁽⁴⁾0 incapacitated for obtaining his subsistence
 by manual labor from the cause above stated.

Origin.

Judging from his present condition, and from the evidence before us
 it is our belief that the said disability did originate in the
 service aforesaid in the line of duty.

Probable duration.

The disability is five years

Particular description.

A more particular description of the applicant's condition is subjoined:
Height, 5-6; weight, 152; complexion, light-
age, 38-; pulse, 100; respiration, 18

This man says he was six weeks in hospital at
New Orleans for fever & ague - Sunstroke June 7
1863 - Wounded at Port Hudson & sent to Hospital at Baton
Rouge 4 months.

We find a pasty complexion, motions
irregular, nervous, unsteady, trembling hands, general
appearance that of a person broken down by malaria,
Liver & spleen normal. Still we believe him to be
suffering from the effects of malaria. Can find
no effects of sunstroke. Wounds slight, & giving him
no present trouble

It must be borne in mind that the duty of the Surgeon is to fix
 the proportionate degree of disability as $\frac{1}{4}$, $\frac{1}{2}$, total, &c., through
 the grades, without any regard to dollars and cents, and to make
 such a full particular description as will afford to this Office the
 ground for intelligent opinion and action in rating.
